The Americas	The two continents of North and South America.
North America	A continent/landmass in the northern hemisphere, that includes the Caribbean Islands and Central America.
South America	A continent/landmass mainly in the southern hemisphere.
Climate zones	Areas with different climates (long term weather), determined by lines of latitude.
Tropics of Cancer	Lines that are north and south of the
and Capricorn	Equator, they define the tropical climate region on Earth.
Human activity	Things that people do or cause to happen.
Population density	The measurement of how many people live in an area
