


Human features

- That places can change over time.






rural countryside, farmland and coasts

Urban areas are more populated than rural areas.

This means more people live in towns and cities than in the countryside.



Key vocabulary and definitions

When an area is being used for a specific purpose to meet the wants and needs of the people.
A place where lots of humans live with lots of building such houses, schools, shops and hospitals.
A place where not many people live, there are fewer homes or other buildings.
Growing and harvesting of crops and raising livestock . It is another word for farming.
Breeding animals, such as cows, sheep, pigs or chickens for their meat or products.
Land is used to grow crops such as wheat or vegetables in fields.
A place where people live and work.
Different ways to travel e.g. car, lorry, aeroplane or train.
A road for fast moving traffic that links urban areas together.
A place lived in by humans.

The UK can grow many things including: grass, grains (e.g. wheat and corn) flowers, fruits and vegetables. Cows, sheep, hens, pigs and goats can be raised too.
