What should I already know?

- Christians follow one God. They believe that Jesus was God's son and came to earth over 2000 years ago.
- Christians believe in the trinity; Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
- Christians believe Jesus was born, lived a life serving others and taught his followers about loving each other. He was crucified and died, after three days he came back to life and ascended to heaven.

Messages from Isaiah the Prophet about Jesus

Key Information

- Other religions believe in incarnation. Hindus believe that their deities are incarnations of Brahman. They represent Brahmans many characters. Jews do not believe that Jesus was the incarnation of God, the Messiah but instead a Prophet.
- Christians believe that Jesus is God incarnated as man. He is both human and God. The Old Testament prophesised that a Messiah would come. Christians believe that the Prophets gave messages about Jesus. Isaiah was a Prophet from the Old Testament and he wrote about a Messiah coming long before Jesus was born. He wrote about a child being born and ruling over his kingdom.
