Barcelona, Spain

From Tues 27th June to Friday 30th June students in Years 8 to 10 participated in the first post-Covid Manor High School trip to Barcelona. The group stayed in a perfectly situated hotel just moments away from the city's famous La Rambla, an iconic boulevard filled with shops, mime artists, street vendors and artists. From there, they were able to explore a number of landmarks on foot, including El Monumento a Colón, a 60 metre tall monument to Christopher Columbus, La Boquería indoor market, Plaça Catalunya and the port, including Maremagnum, one of Barcelona's most distinctive shopping malls right in the centre of the port. There was even a trip to the beach, Barceloneta, with time to relax and play some football and frisbee to unwind on Day 2.

Evening meals were eaten out in a variety of restaurants along La Rambla, and students were able to sample delicious tapas and other authentic Spanish cuisine. Coach visits included Parc del Laberint d'Horta, a historical garden and maze, the city's iconic cathedral, La Sagrada Familia, Gaudí's Parc Güell, and Poble Espanyol, where students shopped for souvenirs and participated in a paella cookery class before sitting down together to enjoy the fruits of their labour over a relaxing lunch! A highlight for many was a full day at WaterWorld in Lloret de Mar, where the adrenaline junkies amongst the group could ride the many and varied flumes and slides, whilst those who wanted a quieter day had the opportunity to relax on sun loungers around the water park's Llac Relax.

The students were true ambassadors for Manor High School and practised their language skills with great enthusiasm, as well as taking part in an interactive treasure hunt stretching from Plaça Catalunya to El Monumento a Colón. Link to trip video

Opal Coast, France

Last week, students across Years 8 to 10 visited the Opal Coast in France. On day 1, students visited Boulangerie Le Fournil, a French bakery where students had the opportunity to learn how to make artisan French bread. The following day, students spent the morning sand yachting in Boulogne-sur-Mer, followed by a visit to Nausicaa Sealife Centre in the afternoon, where students were exposed to 58,000 living creatures including giant manta ray, penguins and sea lions.

Students visited Le Touquet, a French seaside resort and Le Touquet Marché Couvert, a covered market selling delicious fruit, cheeses, seafood and cured meats to sample. A memorable visit for many was a trip to Les Escargots du Bocage, a traditional, working snail farm that sees this French delicacy's journey from farm to plate!

The students' final evening was spent at a local bowling alley in Calais and, on their final day, students experienced a French hypermarket, Auchan, en route to the return ferry, where last-minute gifts and souvenirs were purchased.

In the Spring and Summer Terms, the school continued to use their Music Mark and Bronze Quality Mark efforts to enthuse and include all children in music.

This event was very popular and parents were extremely proud to see their children perform. The students enjoyed the more 'relaxed' performance style of a coffee morning as opposed to a formal concert performance and were delighted to not only share their musicality but get to watch everyone else perform too.



Saving Saffron Brook Project

Overdale Juniors has been privileged to be part of the Saving Saffron Brook project this year, run by Leicester City Council and the Canals and Rivers Trust. They have been working to improve the Ecosytem around the the hope Saffron Brook with to biodiversity, especially increase increasing the populations of bats, kingfishers and otters. Within the grounds, work school has been within completed the brook to naturalize the flow of water and to develop meanders, which has already led to a wider variety in water depth which is ideal for otters. The school has also installed a man-made otter holt which we hope will be inhabited soon!



The project was keen for the children to have greater access to the brook and so a new access point has been created with a platform so the children can sit next to the water and have access for dipping and deeper observations. It is a very peaceful area and has already been visited by all the classes and used for Art, Geography and class reading sessions. This project has also seen the installation of 4 beautiful sculptures around the school: the dragonfly by the pond, the bat by the Addy, the otter in the Spinney and the acorn and oak leaf in the new access area.

These are special reminders of the wonderful grounds we have at Overdale and remind us that we share them with an amazing array of wildlife. We are very grateful for Sam Woods and her team at the Council for all they have brought to us with this project.

500 words competition
